St. John Bosco Conference Campus Ministry Track

The Campus Ministry Track is a comprehensive program offering the methodological, philosophical, and doctrinal topics essential to evangelizing and making disciples on college campuses. Any effort to reach college students must start with a proper Catholic worldview and a missionary mindset. Through presentations by veteran campus ministers, this track will take you through proven practical steps for



developing and growing your campus ministry. Attention is particularly given to sustained, long-term growth and not just short-term gains. You will also have the opportunity to connect with other like-minded campus ministers for mutual support and fellowship.

Assignment Guidelines for Certification:

1. Certification

a. Certification is granted by Franciscan University after a participant has completed 16 workshops, 8 general sessions and 2 papers over the course of 2 summers.

2. Reflection/Analysis Paper

- a. There is one reflection/analysis paper due for each year of the conference (2 papers total). The purpose of the reflection/analysis paper is to expand upon the thoughts presented in the CM workshops and four general sessions attended during the St. John Bosco Conference. You will describe how the information received applies to your particular ministry situation.
- b. The paper may be organized at your discretion, but the content of each of the workshops and general
- c. Sessions must be clearly addressed. Any citations to documents should be made within the text of the paper as follows:
 - i. (Catechism of the Catholic Church 1234) first citation
 - ii. (CCC 1234) all following citations
 - iii. (John 3:16, Revised Standard Version Second Catholic Edition) first citation
 - iv. (John 3:16, RSVSCE) all following citations
- d. <u>Please do not use endnotes or footnotes</u>. Papers and projects will be returned to the candidate as soon as they are read, recorded, and filed in the office of the Catechetical Institute.


